From the principal....

In preparation for the year ahead, staff in our school spend time at the beginning of the term discussing our shared vision for the school and how we are going to work together to achieve this vision. We talk about how we can further strengthen the different teams that make up our school – our whole school team, teaching team, support staff team, leadership team – in order to continue to build a 'strong school' (some of you will have seen this work displayed in our staff room). We look closely at the five dimensions that make up a 'strong school' – clarity of purpose, accountability, effective organisational structures, trust, and opportunities for learning – and monitor our progress towards sustaining the key characteristics of effective teams. Because we are a Catholic school, we also look at these dimensions from a Catholic perspective and keeping our Good Shepherd values in mind. It would be an interesting but difficult exercise to include our 'parent and whānau' team in this work, and yet this team is an integral part of our whole school team and is crucial in ensuring our students are successful learners. We could ask ourselves questions like,

Do we give one another the benefit of the doubt before arriving at a negative conclusion (criteria for a trusting team)?

or

Do we Identify potential problems quickly through open discussion (criteria for an accountable team)?

This week I attended the PTA Annual General Meeting, followed by their first meeting of the year. We are lucky to have this particularly strong team at Good Shepherd, one that makes a huge contribution to the wellbeing and learning of all our children. My sincere thanks to the outgoing executive and congratulations to the incoming position holders. Thank you to all those parents who came along to the meeting, and please consider coming along another time if you were unable to make it. Contained in this newsletter are some suggestions for how we can continue to work together to build a strong school where everybody lives and experiences the values of Jesus, the Good Shepherd.

GOOD SHEPHERD SCHOOL BULLYING PREVENTION AND RESPONSE PROCEDURES

The prevention of bullying in schools and how schools respond to reported cases of bullying are areas that are of interest and concern to everybody in our country. We are fortunate to have 'The Good Shepherd Way' with the emphasis on the school values of respect, care and honesty to help us make our school a respectful and inclusive environment, but it is important that we continue to work together to ensure that our school is a model of best practice in bullying prevention and response. This is a shared responsibility where students, staff, parents, whānau and other members of the community all work towards the same goal. The first step is to ensure we have a shared understanding of what 'bullying' is, and the definition we have shared with our community in the past is:

Bullying behaviour is not an individual action. Our school community agrees that:

- Bullying is deliberate
- Bullying involves a power imbalance
- Bullying has an element of repetition
- Bullying is harmful.

Bullying behaviours can be physical, verbal, or social, and can take place in the physical world or digitally.

Bullying is not an individual action. It involves up to three parties: initiators (those doing the bullying), targets (those being bullied) and often bystanders (those who witness the bullying).

Our response procedures are very clear and are available on our school website. As always, we are open to feedback on this definition, or any other part of the procedures, from anyone in our community.

Good Shepherd School Aquatic Programme

Next week all the children at Good Shepherd School will be beginning aquatic education sessions in our school pool. They are being provided by WaterSafe Auckland, an organisation that focuses on preventing drowning through education. Our sessions will be facilitated by Lynley Stewart, with assistance from classroom teachers. The sessions will run for the whole of Term 1. Each class will receive instruction in the pool and separate classroom sessions, relating to the following skills of water competence:

Safe entry, breath control, stationery surface (front float, tread water), water orientation (turn and roll), swimming competencies (on front and back), underwater competencies (surface dive, swim underwater), safe exit, use of life jackets, open water competencies, knowledge of local hazards, attitudes and behaviours. These extra sessions will enhance what we are already doing in aquatic safety and water education at Good Shepherd School.

For these sessions, the use of goggles will not be permitted. The reason for this is, if a child gets into an unsafe situation in open water, e.g. ocean, lake, river, they are unlikely to be wearing goggles. Statistics tell us that most preventable drownings occur in open water.

"In a drowning prevention context, water competence is the sum of all personal aquatic movements that help prevent drowning, as well as the associated water safety knowledge, attitudes and behaviours that facilitate safety in, on and around water." Moran (2012). A quote from Keith Moran, a leading researcher into drowning prevention at Auckland University.

If you are able to assist in these sessions, e.g. by taking a group or getting into the pool, please let your classroom teacher know and they will give you the times of their specific sessions.

The aquatic education sessions will run alongside regular swimming sessions with classroom teachers in the school pool. In addition, we will again be sending our Year 3 and 4 students to a swimming school for an eight lesson intensive. They will be travelling to Mt Eden Swimming Pool and will be instructed by qualified swim coaches. A separate notice will be sent out next week to the relevant families giving more information about this programme.
