

From the principal....

Talofa Lava as we come to the end of Vaiaso o le Gagana Sāmoa: Sāmoan Language Week

It has been a week of celebration of this beautiful language and culture at Good Shepherd and a lot of the credit must go to our Cultural Leaders, Miracle, Maggie and Bella, who have organised a number of great activities to deepen our understanding of Gagana Sāmoa, the Samoan language, and Fa'asamoa, Sāmoan values. Our school is blessed with a rich diversity of culture and ethnicities and this week we particularly thank our Sāmoan families for being such an important part of our Good Shepherd community.

Children go through a number of transitions in their school lives as they move from early childhood education to begin school, and then shift from primary to intermediate, and on to secondary school. At Good Shepherd School we have a strong focus on successful transitions at these points in our students' learning journeys. Our priority is to ensure that our students' wellbeing is maintained and learning is continuous so that current learning follows on from previous learning.

As you are aware, Good Shepherd is part of the Central Catholic Community of Learning, along with seven other Catholic primary schools and four Catholic secondary schools in our area. One of the purposes of working closely in this community is to strengthen our links with the secondary schools that many of our students move on to.

Last term, Mrs McLeod and I visited many of the Early Childhood centres in our area to talk about how children transition from them to Good Shepherd School, and to share information about our places of learning. Our early childhood colleagues were very pleased to see us, and we were impressed with the quality and diversity of services in early childhood available to our families. A summary of these early childhood centres is included in this newsletter. We are looking forward to visiting more early childhood education providers this term.

Last week was Science Week and rooms 7 & 8 made butter! You may be asking yourself "What does making butter have to do with science?!"

Well, let us tell you!



"Milk is made up of fats and proteins which are suspended in a liquid. Scientifically, this is known as a colloid or an emulsion. If the milk is allowed to sit for a while the tiny fat particles float to the top, creating a layer of cream which can be scraped off.



The fat particles or globules in the cream are held together by a skin. When the cream is shaken, the fat globules start to clump together, trapping tiny air bubbles in between them. This results in a light and air-filled mixture known as whipped cream.







If the mixture is shaken even more, these air bubbles burst and the skin around the fat globules burst, causing the fat particles to spill out. Continued shaking causes the newly freed fat particles to join together forming a solid fat mix. This is the butter which has been separated from the liquid in the cream. The liquid is known as buttermilk, and is great for making pancakes and breads more fluffy."
