

Good Shepherd Awards

Netsafe Tips for Parents:

Understand what they do online

Talk to your child about what they're using the internet for.

- What's involved?
- Who's in their network?
- What information do they share?
- Are they using the internet
 - to learn?
 - to communicate and create friendships with others?
 - to create music or videos?

Really listen to what they have to say – what might seem like 'just a game' to you, could in fact be a way for them to connect with people who have similar interests.

Showing an interest in the things they do helps to build your understanding of what their online world looks like and creates an environment that makes it easier to have more difficult conversations about in the future.

Fortnite Game

We are seeing signs around the school that children are playing this game at home, and bringing some behaviours associated with the game into their play and relationships at school. The recommended age for playing the game is 12+ years and there is some very good advice and guidance for parents on the website below. Growth Mindset and Digital Technology at Good Shepherd School

Growth Mindset


Growth Mindset comes from the research of Carol Dweck. She says that learners with Fixed Mindsets believe they cannot increase their intelligence, so when learning becomes difficult, they may give up. However, those with Growth Mindset believe they can improve their intelligence through putting extra effort into learning, even when it gets difficult. Growth Mindset is also linked to developing resilience and perseverance.

Dweck suggests we can encourage Growth Mindset in children. Schools around the world have developed learning programmes for this. Even early childhood teachers are using books which show Growth Mindset.

There are some interesting ideas around parenting and Growth Mindset. Growth Mindset is not easily passed on from parents, it needs to be taught. Also, 'helicopter' parenting (also known as 'snow ploughing') where parents swoop in to rescue children from difficulty or disappointment, may not help children to gain Growth Mindset.

While we all agree on the value of hard work, some people question whether we can really increase intelligence. Others agree that teaching Growth Mindset doesn't work by 'magic', but suggest there are times when they can trigger major change, especially in students who have doubts about their intelligence and ability.

After investigating all of this, Good Shepherd teachers decided that teaching about Growth Mindset is a good idea for 2019. This will be a strong focus in all learning areas, and will be revisited throughout



the year. Please do discuss this exciting topic with your child as the year progresses.



Digital Technology: Flipped Learning

Digital technology is used a lot in our school and our children are well used to using digital devices within their learning. Recently some teachers have been exploring using digital technology to 'flip our classrooms' and help independent learning. A simple example of this was in Room 3 and 4 last year, when we videod some of Ms Li's Mandarin lessons, and children watched them again in classroom 'breakout' rooms and at home. Children learnt at their own pace, and each time Ms Li came in they were ready to begin the next part of learning because the revision was already done.
