From the principal....

Public consultation on the Tomorrow's Schools Review report,

Our Schooling Futures, Stronger Together | Whiria Ngā Kura Tūātinitini

Hopefully you have all been part of some discussion about this report and its recommendations since our last newsletter. The consultation period on the proposed changes to the way schools are run, governed and managed closes on 7 April, just over three weeks away. It is of utmost importance that the government receives feedback from all sections of our community, staff, board of trustees, parents and the wider community, before they make a decision on the recommendations. The staff and board of Good Shepherd School are considering their joint views on the report for submission, and I urge our parents and whānau to give feedback, either through the channels provided or by way of letters to Members of Parliament.

The report identifies a number of challenges facing our education system at the moment, for example, the fact that some groups within our student population are not achieving as well as others, some boards are unable to attract appropriate people from their communities, the general shortage of teachers, and the lack of support for students with learning needs. One of the major recommendations at the heart of the report is the establishment of 'hubs', which will take over many of the governance and management responsibilities of boards of trustees and principals. These include appointment and appraisal of principals, learning support provision, control of enrolment schemes, legal employment of teachers and monitoring of school performance. There is real concern that these hubs, which could be responsible for up to 120 schools, will create more problems than they will solve, undoing all the good work that is currently happening and removing decision-making from the school community to the hub. There is also the possibility of the hubs compromising the Catholic special character of our schools through management of donations, enrolment of students and appointment of staff. If the goal of the changes is to bring about equity across our schooling system, there is little evidence that this wide sweeping change will do this.

GOOD SHEPHERD SCHOOL BULLYING PREVENTION AND RESPONSE PROCEDURES

The prevention of bullying in schools and how schools respond to reported cases of bullying are areas that are of interest and concern to everybody in our country. We are fortunate to have 'The Good Shepherd Way' with the emphasis on the school values of *respect, care* and *honesty* to help us make our school a respectful and inclusive environment, but it is important that we continue to work together to ensure that our school is a model of best practice in bullying prevention and response. This is a shared responsibility where students, staff, parents, whānau and other members of the community all work towards the same goal. The first step is to ensure we have a shared understanding of what 'bullying' is, and the definition we have shared with our community in the past is:

Bullying behaviour is not an individual action. Our school community agrees that:

- Bullying is deliberate
- Bullying involves a power imbalance
- Bullying has an element of repetition
- Bullying is harmful.

Bullying behaviours can be physical, verbal, or social, and can take place in the physical world or digitally.

Bullying is not an individual action. It involves up to three parties: initiators (those doing the bullying), targets (those being bullied) and often bystanders (those who witness the bullying).

Our response procedures are very clear and are available on our school website. As always, we are open to feedback on this definition, or any other part of the procedures, from anyone in our community.

Children's Art Classes



Two weeks ago children were learning about the Prehistoric art of Stone Age. We learnt about earth colours that had been used in this period, why the prehistoric people chose the composition of Hunting. Good Shepherd Parish

Over the last few years organised youth activity at Good Shepherd Balmoral has been somewhat sporadic.

A number of people have in recent months have expressed a desire to get a youth group off the ground. Last year Pope Francis held the Synod for Young People in Rome and there were a number of gatherings held prior to the synod to engage young people and reflect on their hopes for youth ministry within our diocese. As a response the Auckland Diocese is implementing a trial of a youth ministry programme called Life Teen. It has been very successful overseas. Life Teen was established in 1985 and now runs in 31 countries with over 100,000 teens participating.

Six parishes across the Auckland Diocese are going to trial setting up the programme and Good Shepherd has been approached to be a participating parish.

Life Teen

is a Eucharist-centered movement within the Roman Catholic Church.

Life Teen leads teenagers and their families into a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ and His Church.

Life Teen is a parish based programme with the most amazing resources available to use.

Resources provided are interactive and relevant to the lives of teens. Life Teen offers a creative atmosphere of love and acceptance where teens are encouraged to ask questions about their faith and about why we believe what we believe. They are encouraged to put into practice what they learn. It includes engaging the sacramental life of the church at a meaningful level that allows them to grow stronger every week in their local faith community. Rather

than just having one or two leaders, Life Teen offers a core team model that involves the whole parish and requires a variety of people to be involved in leading ministry - ideally at least one born in each decade (so no "I'm too old" excuses!).

Some people minister 'up front', some are working in pairs accompanying a small group of five or six teens and others are 'behind the scenes' setting things up, providing music ministry, providing prayer support or hospitality etc

Think about the teenagers you know or see or don't see around . Today's teens do not know a time without mobile phones or Netflix. They have the world in many ways at their fingertips. This provides them with both opportunities and challenges. Young people need people who can accompany them, especially in the teen years, to grow in a faith that is relevant to them.

To get this off the ground at Good Shepherd we need people with an enthusiasm and care for the well-being of our young people, along with a desire for leading teens closer to God. We are called to accompany our young people, bringing Christ to lives right where they are - be it on the sports field, at youth group or at home.

My hope is that Life Teen will be embraced by Good Shepherd Parish Balmoral.

Next Sunday March 17 after the 9.30am Mass at 11.00am I'm inviting you to attend an information session. Members of the Diocesan Youth Ministry Team will be present to present the Life Teen Programme and lead the discussion. Further formation for Core team members will be offered later at a national training convention at St Peter's College with three amazing speakers from the United States on the weekend of 12-14 April. Please consider supporting this initiative as we 'grow' this wonderful and vibrant parish Blessings, Bernard
