Room 8's Writing about their Science Trip

The Science Trip By Ayrestyn

Room 8 is on a science trip to Point Chevalier Beach to test the water to see if it is appropriate for the fish and other sea creatures,



as well as to see if it is healthy or not for people to swim in.

There are eight different unique groups to test the main factors that affect the water quality, which are water clarity, water flow, water depth, water temperature, moss on rocks and gravel and sediment. Our Group is testing what we can see around us at Point Chevalier Beach and the activity is called Streambed Composition.

My group tries to use a periscope which allows you to put your eye on the top and you can see what is at the Bottom of the microscope. There is a hole on the other end of a periscope that you can see things in the water such as bedrocks, small cobbles, man-made things, sand and many more things that are there. However the periscope does not help as we planned. So we just stand in the water and scoop things up. We mostly find sand and some different sized stones. They are five small cobbles, four pieces of man-made things, thirteen pieces of sand and one piece of mud or silt. We do not find any bedrocks, boulders, or large cobbles.

Our experiment result shows that people can find different sized stones underwater in Pt Chevalier Beach. This tells us that there should be lots of living things that are living in the water. Lots of different sizes of stones means greater biodiversity. This means there will be a lot of small living things on the beach. This also means that the water on Pt Chevalier Beach is healthy. So the water is good for sea creatures to live in and it is also safe for people to swim.
