One of the key messages from the session was that we need to have layers of protection to ensure online safety. There is no one thing that will keep everyone safe online - we need to be working on multiple fronts. You can access a first layer by using the Ministry of Education and Network 4 Learning's simple but effective free content filtering service Switch on safety. We will include some tips from Netsafe in our newsletter content but do recommend that you visit their website for very helpful and timely tips and strategies to help us through these days of home learning.

Mathigon Resource

Good Shepherd teachers value their partnership with kāinga, and now more than ever, we consider you as co-teachers. We would like you to help us assess the value of learning resources



and sites. This week one of the sites we looked at is Mathigon. Have a quick look at this <u>Check Out Mathigon</u> video I made (sorry about the clicking you will need to mute it). Go to the <u>site</u> and have a try yourself. Please watch the Multiplication by Heart <u>tutorial</u> because we think this is a promising and very manageable way to learn timetables - at least two thirds of our Year 4-6 children identify this as an area of need.

Help your child to log in **using their Good Shepherd gmail account** (so that we can monitor their progress easily) and help them have a look around. They may find they are 'already there'. If they are Year 4-6 and not 100 percent fluent with times tables, please get them started on the <u>Multiplication by Heart</u> journey. Younger children may also benefit. Tip for Online Safety - Create a Learner Profile

One of the challenges of home learning is the number of distractions that are immediately there when we are online. Creating a 'Learner Profile' for your child draws a line between the 'learner' and 'leisure' profiles and helps remove distractions for children (and adults!). It involves removing extra 'stuff' - a good guideline is to have only four tabs open at a time.
