

From the principal....

I often think that schools are the best working environment you could possibly ask for! Those of us who are privileged to work in education love working with children, shaping their learning and their overall development and creating opportunities for them to reach their potential. Schools, along with families and whānau, have a role in forming good citizens who successfully live, learn, work and contribute to their communities. In the case of Catholic schools, this role extends to ensuring our children develop a personal relationship with God.

Our job, therefore, extends much further than teaching children how to read, write, compute, or the content of the eight learning areas described in our curriculum (nine including Religious Education). The New Zealand Curriculum has identified five *Key Competencies* that will not only enable children to become successful learners, but will also support them in reaching their potential as adults. These key competencies are:

- Thinking
- Using language, symbols and texts
- Managing self
- Relating to others
- Participating and contributing

Relating to others fits particularly well with our school charism, which focuses on Jesus, the Good Shepherd as our role model. The New Zealand Curriculum describes students who relate well to others as being *aware of how their words and actions affect others* (p.12) and this is very much part of our Good Shepherd Way where we respect and care for others in what we say and do. Children (and often adults too) will sometimes use words that hurt others and our core values provide us with a shared language to talk to them about the effects of this behavior. Today we are sending home to you again our summary of 'The Good Shepherd Way' so that you can use the same language, if you so wish, when discussing this aspect of 'relating to others' with your children. Working in close partnership with our parents and whānau is another great thing about working in schools!
