Last week you received the Good Shepherd Strategic Plan 2017-2019, presented in a brochure. I thought that this is a perfect opportunity to share the progress we have made towards two of the four strategic goals.

Special Character

Our students develop a personal relationship with God and grow in knowledge of Jesus the Good Shepherd, living and experiencing his values on a daily basis.

Visiting during school hours:

We understand that sometimes parents need to come into school during school hours to drop off lunches or sports gear from time to time. However, it is important that when these times occur you come in through the office, even if you are just popping in quickly. This procedure is set in place so that the school are aware of everyone in the school at any one time and for the safety of the students.

Imaginary Play for Year 5 and 6 students

Once again our Year 5 and 6 students are invited to participate in Imaginary Play sessions at lunchtimes on Fridays. This is one of those great parent-run initiatives that encourages children to play cooperatively and in ways that may be different from the usual form of play they engage in, using different, non-routine equipment. Part of this approach is to encourage children to take acceptable risk in their play, and although we do not normally allow children to climb trees during the school day, they are allowed to do so during the Imaginary Play sessions. As always, our first consideration is the safety and wellbeing of our students and we believe that by encouraging them to judge what is acceptable in terms of risk will equip them with skills to make good judgments in the future.

If you **do not want** your child to participate in this particular activity, please communicate this to the school office in writing. We thank Julie O'Toole for organizing these sessions for our senior students.

LOST IN SPACE

SNAPSHOT OF OUR LEARNING SO FAR IN SPACE

In Room 6 we have been learning about space, the solar system and how all life depends on the Sun. We have been learning about the earth's movement and how that influences the world around us.

We learnt about the stars and constellations. A star is a bright object that is created from burning gases, the two most common gases are hydrogen and helium. It is through these gases that energy is produced creating light and heat. The colours of the stars show how hot or cold they are and what phase they are in of their lifespan. The star in our solar system is the Sun, all other stars are billions of light years away. A constellation is a pattern / picture in the sky created by a group of stars. Stars in the night sky were used to navigate the earth long ago as different constellations appear during certain months and in different hemispheres. In pairs we selected our favourite constellation, researched their names, myths, when they appear and then we recreated the constellation. Here is a sample of our constellations.



One of the key parts to understanding more about our solar system was to learn 'How to move like the earth.' We learnt the difference between rotation (spinning) and revolution (orbiting). We made pipe cleaner bracelets with a little bead to understand the terms. Rotation was the little bead spinning on the pipe cleaner that represented the how earth spins on its axis to cause day and night. Revolution was the little bead moving around our wrist that showed the earth moving around the Sun, our wrist being the Sun. We learnt that this took 365 ¼ days to complete one full revolution, this causing the seasons.





We then learnt about day and night by creating posters to show how the sun and the rotation of the earth on its axis creates day and night. We understand that when one side of the earth is facing away from the Sun it is night, while the other side that is facing the Sun is day. Next we moved on to the revolution of the earth to learn about the earth's orbit and how that movement creates our seasons. When one side of the earth is closer to the sun it is summer but on the other side of the earth it is winter, the same can be said for autumn and spring. Each season lasting 3 months.

To help us learn more about the solar system, we got a chance to go to the Stardome to watch the show 'Perfect Little Planet' to see what it is like in space and what each



planet is made of. We also saw that all the planets go around the sun at different speeds depending on how far away they are from the Sun.



Recently we have been focusing on the phases of the Moon, there are 8 phases in total. We have learnt that the moon never changes shape or size; we see the side of the moon that is facing the sun and receiving the light of the sun. Therefore, we can always see the whole moon but the part we cannot see falls under the shadow of the Earth, so that is why we only see a little portion of the Moon at times. To learn about the phases we created a Moon Spinner that shows the 8 phases, with the sun behind the new Moon.



During reading, we had the opportunity to select a planet or key element in our solar system. We read a range of text and articles to group key ideas and present our learning to our audience. We are in the process of presenting our reading posters, keep an eye out and visit room 6 in up and coming weeks to come to see our factual posters.
