## What is emotional resilience?

Emotional resilience refers to the ability to manage feelings and cope with day-to-day stresses as well as major life events. This includes being able to recognise, understand and accept feelings, and express them in appropriate ways that do not harm others. It also involves being able to face and resolve unpleasant situations and cope with very stressful or upsetting events.

Children have different temperaments and some are more sensitive or emotionally expressive than others. However, it is important for all children to learn and manage emotions. Their ability to recognise, understand and deal with different emotions develops gradually.

# Guidelines for parents/caregivers who are taking students out of school for the purposes of an overseas holiday

If you are taking your child out of school for the purpose of an overseas holiday please note the following:

- Good Shepherd School strongly encourages students to be at school every day possible
- The Ministry of Education considers holidays during term time an unjustifiable absence and requires schools to record them as such
- While holidays overseas may provide valuable learning experiences, they can cause gaps in students' learning that are not easily detected or filled
- If you are considering taking your child out of school during term time, notification needs to be sent in writing to the principal
- Extended absences during term time adds to teachers' workload as they try to make up lost learning time in core subject areas
- Teachers are not able to provide individualised learning programmes for students who are absent during term time on overseas holidays

You can minimise the disruption to your child's learning by the following:

## Reading

- Ensuring they are reading a range of material every day
- Talking to them about their reading
- Talking to your child while you enjoy these new experiences together

## Writing

- Helping your child to email, text or write to family and friends about their experiences while they are away
- If age appropriate, supporting your child to keep a diary or journal about their experiences
- Helping your child to create a scrapbook recording all your adventures while away
- Talking about and being interested in what your child writes

## **Mathematics**

- Seeking out any opportunity to discuss mathematics in everyday situations
- Supporting your child to learn age and stage-appropriate mathematical knowledge, e.g. addition and subtraction facts to 20, times tables to ten times ten

## **ROOM 9'S SPACE INVASION**

As part of our inquiry into space, the Moon and the Sun, Room 9 have completed some research projects. Through reading many books and websites, we have learned some amazing facts and would like to share them with you!

Liam B - The Sun's real name is Sol, and it is 4.5 billion years old. As it gets older it will grow bigger and eventually eat Earth.

Elijah B - A day on the planet Mercury can be up to 427 degrees Celsius. The night can go down to -173 degrees Celsius!

**Soeun P** - The Sun is travelling at 220 kilometres per second. After it gets big and consumes Earth it will collapse and become tiny. This is because stars swell up and then collapse when they are very old.



**Kara M** - Venus is the hottest planet in the solar system because the clouds trap the heat inside. The clouds are made of carbon dioxide, sulphuric acid and mercury. Mercury is a poisonous metal and the other ones are poisonous gases. Venus spins very slowly - one day on Venus is longer that one year on Earth!

Henry O - Jupiter has no surface, because it is a gas giant. So we can't land on it. Jupiter also spins very fast and has the shortest day out of all the planets.

**Joey M** - There are 5 dwarf planets in our solar system. They are called Pluto, Ceres, Makemake, Haumea and Eris. Eris is named after the Roman god of discord (which means arguing). Most of them are out past Neptune, but Ceres is in the asteroid belt between Mars and Jupiter.

Lucy L - The Sun is a star. It is mostly made of a gas called hydrogen. Light from the Sun takes 8 minutes to reach Earth. The surface temperature is 13,600,000 degrees Celsius!

Seihara A - The Moon is a natural satellite of Earth. It takes 27 days to orbit Earth and also 27 days to rotate.
